It deepens the management of European projects and the Next Generation EU, both in theory and through expert seminars. It also focuses on innovative practices of government, such as e-government, and encourages debating and finding citizens' friendly and sustainable solutions on the basis of the general principles. It includes a simulation of decision-making at the EU level and/or city level and contacts with decision and policy makers, experts and administrators at the European, national and city level.</p>
